
January 18—The Second Sunday in Ordinary Time

Baptism. We hear about Jesus' baptism again this week because we are invited to reflect on the power and the importance of our own baptism. Just as Jesus' identity and mission are revealed in the baptism so is ours. Baptism is in fact, as many saints and popes have attested, the most important sacrament, as it is the gateway to all of the rest. Like confirmation and ordination, baptism cleanses our soul and confers on it an indelible mark which ontologically changes us. That simply means that in our very being, our essence, we have been changed and now are incorporated into Christ. How do we open our ears to hear and open our eyes to see or open our mouth to proclaim his good news? The answer is the cross. We cannot be a follower of Christ or disciple unless we are able to carry His cross.

Lamb. John the Baptist proclaims the identity and mission of Jesus by proclaiming what we repeat at every mass when the priest holds up the Eucharist. "This is the Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world." In order to appreciate and understand this title we need only look at the exist and how God saved and liberated the Hebrew people in Egypt. He did so of course by inviting them to sacrifice a lamb and place its blood over the door in order that death would pass over them. When his people were spared death and liberated from Egypt, he commanded them to remember it every year during the feast of Passover. Jesus in fact was a good jew and was merely celebrating the feast of Passover when he did something amazing. He transformed it! He said you don't need a lamb, I am the lamb of God and you don't need its blood because I'm going to pour out my blood to save you not from slavery in Egypt, but a far worse evil, the slavery of sin.

Eucharist. So, what is our response to this heroic, unselfish and self-sacrificing act? As baptized into his death and resurrection, we are called to be reminded of our own identity to continue his mission so that we don't merely receive the Eucharist but rather, we are called to be the Eucharist. What does that mean? To be self-sacrificing disciples who are willing to lay down our lives for others.
